

# Securing Her Future Capital Campaign

Doubling Neema's impact with our brand new permanent campus for our students, their children, and our staff.

In October 2022, we launched the Securing Her Future campaign with a goal of raising \$550,000 by 2024 to build Neema's new, permanent campus with the intent to double Neema's capacity. Thanks to the loan of a generous donor, we were able to build our new campus in 2023—a full year ahead of schedule! Students and staff moved into the campus in September 2023.

The Grand Opening in November, attended by over 600 individuals, including Neema's staff, students, members of the community, and US guests, was a joyous celebration.

Raising the funds to pay back the loan is no small task for Neema, but we are grateful for the donors who have already helped raise over \$423,000.

# What is life like for girls growing up in rural Kenya?

Seven factors contributing to the vulnerability of young women.

Many families make less than \$2/day. 38% of individuals in rural Kenya live in poverty.<sup>1</sup> Living in rural areas puts young women at a greater disadvantage because of fewer job opportunities. Many resort to selling vegetables on the street or other forms of casual labor, but none of these will sufficiently provide for a family. This is why the cycle of poverty is so difficult to break.



- Most girls drop out of school by 8th grade. While public school is technically free, students are required to pay for various supplies, which is often too much for families. Less than 25% of women in rural Kenya who went to school completed high school, crushing their opportunities for a better future.<sup>2</sup> Lacking school fees, girls drop out of school, leaving them with no real option to further their education.
  - A high rate of teen pregnancies. 40% of women aged 15-19 who have no education have been pregnant, compared to 5% of women who have more than secondary education. Adolescent pregnancies are more likely in poor areas: 21% of women aged 15-19 in the lowest wealth quintile have been pregnant, compared to 8% in the highest.<sup>3</sup> Teenage moms face a societal stigma threatening their chances of further education or career opportunities, making them even more vulnerable.

- Families prioritize their sons' education. Reportedly, when families have limited resources, boys are given educational priority since they are considered the future caregivers for the family.<sup>4</sup> Girls however, despite equal access to education, also face barriers such as heavy domestic workloads, adolescent marriage and pregnancies, and are therefore, unable to develop advanced literacy skills or other skills that could lift them out of poverty.
- Parents marry away their daughters to get a dowry. 23% of married women age 20-24 were married before they were 18 (the legal age), 4% before they were 15.5 Parents perceive their daughters as an investment. While there is no standard process, the tribe's culture will dictate the terms of the dowry. It is generally equivalent to five years of the groom's salary, paid in monetary or in kind (livestock), often in installments.
- Many women in rural Kenya experience violence. 41% of women and girls age 15-49 in the county Neema is in have experienced physical violence since the age of 15.6 "Kenya continues to witness social tolerance for violence against women, with 42% of women and 36% of men believing a man can be justified for beating his wife under certain circumstances."7
- Women aren't empowered to make their own choices. Only 29% of women in Kenya are considered "empowered" as of 2020.8 To be empowered, a woman has to have viable options to choose—the ability to decide how she will live her life. Rural Kenya is a patriarchal society where cultural attitudes around gender roles and norms exacerbate gender inequalities. It's also twice as likely for women in urban areas to be empowered in comparison to those in rural Kenva.9

# **Skills Training:**

# Tailoring & Dressmaking

#### **NITA Exams**

Our team prepares our students to take up to three levels of national certifications that attest to their dressmaking skills.

## Internship in Neema Shop

Third-year students spend one year in Neema's shop where they continue their education while interacting with customers and learning how to run a small business. To supplement their sewing skills, we invite guest professional instructors to lead workshops throughout the year.

## Neema Fashion Show

In November, we held our third annual Fashion Show. Under the leadership of a fashion designer and our Business Skills Development Mentor, third-year students and alumni created their own outfits. All students and alumni got to walk the runway, wearing and showing off the dresses, jumpers, and outfits they each made from scratch. They confidently walked the catwalk and were greeted by proud parents, friends, or Neema staff as they came off the stage. At the Fashion Show, Ruth, a 2019 Graduate, said, "Once I was nothing, but now I am somebody."

"I got my job at [the] Kitale Wool Shop in 2022... Apart from working [there], I also work here at home. I have my customers who usually come and give me [a] job. I make some dresses, skirts, and even shorts. [At Neemal, I also learned how to make records and do calculations at the workplace ... Now, I have my own money. I can pay school fees [for my daughter,] and I send some money for my brother and sisters so they can get food and their basic needs. And I also help my uncle ... In this society, I would like to empower other girls to get skills so that they can take care of themselves and know the Word of God."

## Livelihood Classes & Permaculture

## Permaculture Instruction

We also started teaching about permaculture farming with the hope that our students start farming different varieties of nutritious crops once they leave Neema.

Brenda says, "I like permaculture because it is teaching me how to plant different type of veggies without using fertilizer—instead, we use organic methods. I really enjoy harvesting fresh vegetables. My son Jayden likes sukuma wiki and whenever we prepare it, I always see a smile on his face which makes me happy."

# Discipleship

Through the Alpha Course and daily prayers, singing, and learning from Scripture, eight young women committed their lives to Christ in 2023.

At Neema, our commitment is not just to impart knowledge but to facilitate a spiritual journey that transcends the academic, touching the core of each student's being and leading them towards a life enriched by faith, love, and grace.

#### Father Heart of God Training

The majority of our students received Christian instruction from their churches and schools, but often, the teaching was unclear and they did not know how to build a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Prior to coming to Neema, we invite them together with their quardians to the Father Heart of God training. Students are taught that the loving, compassionate Father Heart of God enables to overcome insecurity and the devastating effects of some of life's most painful experiences. By discovering the forgiveness that they have in Christ, families begin to learn to fogive one another.

#### Alpha Program & Bible Studies

Upon their arrival at Neema, each student receives a Bible. Certified trainers take on the responsibility of imparting the transformative teachings of the Alpha Discipleship Program, aimed at fortifying the foundation of their Christian faith. They cover topics such as who Jesus is and why he died. We place the emphasis on instilling in our students a profound understanding of God's unconditional love and the transformative power of forgiveness. Through

comprehensive instruction, we quide them in individual and group prayer, fostering a deeper relationship with God.

Beyond the Alpha Program, in 2023, Neema's curriculum included other enriching series such as "The Young Peacemaker," "Daughters of Grace," "The Miracle of Jesus," and "Proverbs 31 Woman." These series delve into various aspects of faith, character development, and the embodiment of virtuous qualities.

A significant focus of our teachings involves delving into the narratives of women in the Bible. We believe that these stories are not only a source of inspiration, but serve as a path for our students to experience God in profound ways that are bound to catalyze changes in their lives.

#### Going to a New Church

Our students also regularly attend church on Sundays to discover the benefits of belonging to a church community. After graduating, a lot of our alumni take on leadership positions in their local church where they have a supportive Christian community. Local pastors also come regularly to teach the students and/or their guardians.

#### Welcoming Neema's Chaplain

Our local chaplain, Caroline Sudi, visited about twice a month in 2023 to teach our students and pray with them. She also leads devotions on Guardians' Day or other celebratory events attended by guardians and community members.



At the age of sixteen, Susan had to drop out of school because living in extreme material poverty left her parents unable to pay for the necessary school supplies and uniform. Her father is polygamous and lives with his first wife and children. He does not financially support Susan's mother who sells vegetables and sugarcane in an effort to earn income to support her eight children. Although Susan scored high marks on her exams, she was left vulnerable without a complete education.

When Susan joined Neema, she was happy to be where she has a dry bed to sleep in, unlike her home which frequently floods. Since graduating, Susan got married and opened her own dressmaking shop where she is excelling: her shop is well stocked and she also runs a hair salon. She's expanded her shop to sell fabric.

Susan says, "I really want to appreciate all of the Neema staff and Grace Partners for supporting me, catering for my needs for those three years. God bless you so much. For sure, the life I have now is really different from the life I had before. The skills and knowledge that [Neema] impacted on me, these skills [are] a blessing to me. It makes me happy each and every day because it provides for me and my family. I am also able to do different [types of outfits] and am proud of it."

Susan financially supports her family, including her husband, mother, and father. She hopes that when she has tender, she will give work to Neema students during their internship year.

Susan's dream is to open a fabric wholesale store. She wants to be traveling to Kampala, Uganda to buy fabric and sell it here in Kitale, Kenya to other tailors. She says, "My dream is to have a bigger shop so that I can employ and also teach some girls that are passionate about dressmaking."

Recalling her experience at Neema, Susan says, "When I joined Neema, I had no confidence and communication was also a problem. I could not stand before my fellow students or staff to present anything. But after going through counseling and social classes, I now use the techniques we were taught to talk to my customers."



## Brenda in the new campus classrooms (Class of 2024)


## **REVENUE**








## Meet Esther, Class of 2024


